A question we are frequently asked is "Where do your rescues come from? Who would no longer want their Airedale?" The answer is varied, as there are many circumstances surrounding the surrender of a dog. Billy's story is a little unconventional and special. It's a story of timing, collaboration, teamwork and a little luck.

Billy showed up on the website Adopt-A-Pet for a brief period of time. So brief that our National Airedale Rescue team, who scours listings for possible Airedales across the USA in shelters on a daily basis, did not even see his post. However, it was not missed by one of our dedicated rescue family members, and thankfully our friend Susy immediately contacted ARADV. Timing is everything in rescue.

Billy was in the care of a rescue group called White Diamond Merle Rescue in Delaware. The group's mission is to take in dogs from the South who are special needs. Billy, fully blind from cataracts, was on death row at a shelter near Baton Rouge, LA and Chris at White Diamond had recently had him shipped up to her foster home. His picture was so upsetting - I will not share it. He was in terrible condition and obviously had been on his own for some time. Mary Jo immediately called White Diamond and asked if we could collaborate with her and take him into our care and she willingly released him to us.

I met Chris at a halfway point near the Delaware Memorial Bridge early Saturday morning, before her shift at the local shelter. She is a dedicated rescue person, shelter

Our first day was spent at the vet to evaluate Billy's skin, tumors and immediate needs. He had 4 large tumors that needed to be addressed, as well as some dental issues. We did a senior blood panel which indicated excellent levels all around! Yay! We scheduled him for a dental and the mass removals. He has very sparse fur from the shoulders down from flea dermatitis, and was treated at the LA shelter for flea infestation. While now comfortable and not scratching, I'm not sure his fur will completely grow back. But, nothing a sweater can't fix in his new home in the Northeast.

I was due to take a planned trip the following week so I needed to find him a safe spot to land for a bit. Here's where the teamwork comes in. I remembered a blind dog named Fosh who came to one of our Aire Faires a few years back and knowing she had passed, I called her mom Lydia. Lydia – despite being in between moving – readily agreed to take in Billy for the 2 weeks while I was away! She showed up at the meeting spot in her perfect minivan and took him

away to her new one level retirement home, where he became a big hit with the neighbors. A huge thank you to Lydia for stepping up to the plate during a tough time and helping out in a pinch!

Surgery was scheduled for November 19th and Billy came through it like a champ. He had 4 significant wound sites and lost 10 teeth during the dental, but mostly the tiny front incisors. Three in the top back left were removed. They were infected and surely painful. Our main goal at this time was to get this gentleman comfortable. We did a biopsy on 2 of the tumors. Two looked similar and the other two looked similar in the surgeon's opinion. In the meantime, Billy has healed beautifully and has been a stellar patient! Billy has touched the hearts of many Airedale friends – see our Donations page and see all the love and support in his honor!

The news of his biopsies is BENIGN!! We are so thrilled to hear that Billy is healthy again and ready for a second chance at life – one that is comfortable, with good nutrition and full of love and walkies. Luck was really on Billy's side because the vet initially said the tumors looked "angry."

Billy was surely loved by someone at some point because he loves to come up on your lap for hugs and petting. He has wonderful house manners, never barks BUT he is a night howler!! If anyone has ever had a night howler, you know how fun this is. He will break into "the song of his people" once every week or two in the middle of the night. It is a rare special gift that will lead you to 3AM laughter. My first Airedale did it and no others since (many fosters) so it is special!

Billy is estimated to be between 10-12 years old and weighs 60 pounds. He is good with other gentle dogs and enjoys taking a slow walk, sniffing things along the way. He does not ask for much other than good food, a soft place to lay his head and a home with few or no steps would be ideal. He manages extremely well with my 5 steps out to the yard and he learned them within one or two passes. Besides some yeasty ears which need drops a few times a week, he has no other health issues. He takes supplements for his joints, which we always recommend for all seniors, and Omega 3 for his skin, which is no longer dry and flaky. He is certainly welcome to spend his golden years here but I think he still has a lot to offer. If you would like to consider adding Billy to your family, please call Deb at 609-313-4765.

Olive and the Noises

Olive is our second Airedale. She was rehomed to us just before Christmas 2016 after her lifelong owners discovered that an energetic 60-pound dog dashing about was not compatible with 1-year-old twins. She settled in about 10 minutes after coming through our door and, aside from flying past my nose in full leap, and taking just one lick on the rotisserie chicken temptingly sitting on the cutting board, has been little trouble. Unlike our precious Lily, she enjoys time spent on our back porch, admiring her domain, noting the dogs being walked in the neighborhood, and passing rabbits, and warning off the occasional cats, deer, and foxes.

Her one issue has been noises of any kind. Some just invite her curiosity, which must be immediately satisfied. And being "out in the county," we are in earshot of firearm discharges way too often. But thunder is the worst. Living in the mountains, in the South, thunder happens. Early in her time with us, she found comfort in the dark, relatively isolated hall past the laundry room and out toward the garage. She still heads that way when the distant rum-

bles grow closer. I open the door to that hall (before she opens it herself), invite her in, and give her my standard speech about "the bumps." Lately she actually listens and seems more comfortable (after a quick tour of the hall) just staying close to us.

The tail is still down, we still have some drool to wipe up, her posture is still sitting up, back to us (which is Airedale for "get me out of here"), but she is less obviously fearful. It appears that she is actually listening to my explanations of what is going on, and reinforcing statements about our safety. "That thunder, it's going to STAY outside. It means it might rain. We're OK in Daddy's house." Whether it's the fact that I always use the same description, the tone of voice, or actual comprehension, I don't know. But it seems like she has come to accept that, as little as she likes the noise, it will pass in time and no one will be injured. We are now at a point where Olive is able to manage her fears well enough to avoid panic, and trust that we will keep her safe. And when our walks are interrupted by distant gun fire, she always wants to head for the safety of Daddy's house.

Alice and the Thunder

Olive's story reminds me of one of our fosters, Alice, who came to us at the age of two. She was adopted by Glenn and Ginger Lambert, but she stayed with us whenever they traveled.

We quickly discovered that Alice reacted strongly to thunder, fireworks, and other similar noises. She panicked and frantically started to try to dig through the floor of any room she was in, perhaps to find sanctuary below or merely out of frustration and fear.

Unlike the Taylors' successful approach with Olive, Trying to comfort her or talk to her proved futile. What we ended up doing was placing her in a bathtub upon seven or eight large beach towels.

Then we closed the blinds and turned on a radio.

Alice predictably tried to dig through the towels and the tub. But we soon discovered that Alice was a fan of the "oldies," for she calmed down when we played 70's through 90's rock from a local FM station at a high volume to block all outside noise.

She stopped digging, gained control of her panting and fear, and lay down. After a few minutes she accompanied the music with her snoring.

We did this every time there was a thunderstorm or fireworks with the same result. Whatever works! And it helped that my wife and I shared Alice's taste in music.

An Airedale Paved the Way for First Dogs

The White House is preparing for many changes, not the least of which is its new canine residents, German shepherds Major and Champ. I began this article even before the president-elect injured his foot playing with them-making them all the more famous. Regardless of which political party inhabits its walls, this imposing fortress is always more friendly with a dog. Until 2017, the last time there was a pet-free ad-

ministration was William McKinley's presidency from 1897 to 1901.

The very first presidential pet to go viral – if that had been a thing back then – was an Airedale named Laddie Boy belonging to President Warren Harding. Laddie Boy was 6 months old when he was delivered to his new family at the White House one day

after Harding moved in. The White House staff interrupted Harding's very first cabinet meeting at his request to introduce him to Laddie Boy. "With many manifestations of pleasure, the President led his new pet into his office, where he made himself at home," wrote a *Times* reporter on March 5, 1921.

The Hardings were certainly Dog People, as evidenced by the fact that Laddie Boy was ingrained in their daily life. He was not just there for photo ops and interviews, nor did he spend any time that we know of in the White House kennels. It was said that he was like the child the President and First Lady never had. (They did both have children from other rela-

tionships, but none that lived with them.) Being the First Dog does afford you privileges not bestowed upon just any pooch, though. He was Harding's golf buddy, advisor in cabinet meetings, (in his own chair, no less), and a



fundraising ambassador with the first lady.

Our soon-to-be first dogs Major and Champ have stories of their own, and will have a book published about them on January 19, 2021. They also have various social media accounts where fans can learn more about them – follow first_dogs_usa to take a peek. Through myriad dog breeds, cats of all sorts, horses, birds, opossums, and a raccoon, we have waited until the present era to welcome a rescue dog into those esteemed walls. Major was 10 months old when the Bidens brought him home from the Delaware Humane Association to be fostered and then officially adopted. He joined Champ, who

I suddenly lost my Valentine on October 18, 2020 to a tumor on the spleen. As many of us in the Airedale family know, the splenic tumor has no symptoms. Val was lying on his dog bed watching the Eagles lose yet another ugly loss when I gave him his dinner and he wouldn't eat. That was alarming because he loved his food. I rushed him to the emergency vet and he was gone. Even though he was 13 years old, he was the most beautiful and healthy boy. It was shocking.

Val and his litter came into rescue in 2007 in an SPCA abuse case. There were multiple pups with two moms and all were placed. He lived with his family for 8 years until he was returned to rescue in an anxious condition. He was fostered by my dear friend Maureen but he was in need of professional intervention so he came to live with me in December 2015. I hoped we could turn him around but with a bite history, he stayed with me. We gave him the care he needed through a

wonderful veterinarianbehaviorist, and with antianxiety medication, and he remained my resident dog for 5 vears.

In Gratitude for Tai, Our Miracle Airedale

Even if you never met Octavious Christopher "Tai" Johnson, you surely have celebrated with us as he was mentioned and photographed for over 6 years of this newsletter. He was the honorary ChairDale of last year's Farm Day. The event announcement and even the cake served at the event featured his jaunty cowboy photo. Yes, I cried when I saw the cake...yes, I am crying as I write this.....

Tai came to us as a 6 year old who was surrendered to Rescue after his human passed. He knew love and he gave love and thrived in exhibiting all of his unique Airedale tricks, most notably, his ability to open the refrigerator door. Tai was a self-taught therapy and emotional support companion. He brought joy and hope to friends and family. He was a frequent visitor to a local nursing home where my now-departed Aunt Mary lived. He specialized in napping with Aunt Mary. He greeted each resident with his gentle demeanor while Aunt Mary bellowed "He is here for ME"!

Most unexpectedly one afternoon during a naptime, he stood up and spun around several times. I grabbed my phone and made a video of the event. With this minimum of a symptom, and after neurological testing at the University of Pennsylvania, Tai was diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumor at the base of his pituitary. He was given 4 to 6 months to live. He lived almost 4 extra years!

With this diagnosis, we learned the value of celebrating each and every day. Tai did suffer occasional seizures and the daily required anti-seizure medication and the high dose steroids added their effects to his body. And, yet, he remained our Tai, our joyous boy. Tai made sure that we supplied the mailman with dog cookies to be shared along the route. Even to the end, Tai enjoyed his walks. Due to his condition, his fur was thin and he was missing fur on sections. Tai's Aunt Serafina and Uncle Mike Lurski gifted him with a lovely and enviable selection of coats.

On one particular walk during the warmer months, we

passed students from a nearby charter high school. The students were at recess. student loudly proclaimed that my dog was the ugliest dog that she had ever seen. In that moment, the terrier inside me led me to reply to that student that my dog had brain cancer which affected his fur growth and frankly he knew he was the most beautiful dog ever. I also cautioned her to never judge a dog or a person by their appearance. The

blessing was that the other students rallied to support Tai and to say how beautiful he was. They actually chastised their classmate for her comment. Needless to say, Tai was a gift in so many ways.

A long goodbye is no easier than a sudden loss. Reading about Valentine and Tai is a reminder that these Airedales live to give their all. Tai had a brother, Rescue Airedale Nathan Paul Slade Johnson, who he welcomed without reserve. Nathan was older when he joined our family and Nate passed after only 2 years, 2 months and 2 weeks with us. Nate was named in honor of his Godmother, Carole Slade. Ironically, Nathan joined our family 2 weeks before Tai's diagnosis. There are no coincidences when love is involved.

We had to make that final decision for Tai on August 12th. My theory is that I have sent-ahead my own Heavenly Welcoming Committee. The term "you had me at hello" surely applies to Tai. Until we say hello again, dear Tai.....




