It was a bright spring day in rural Pennsylvania. A young woman named Riley knew her father's friend "Joe" had horses at his farm and thought it would be a great day to go for a trot. She loaded up her gear and a girlfriend and headed over to Joe's farm. She hadn't been to Joe's farm for several years since she was away at college but she had always enjoyed riding his horses in the past.

Upon arriving, she noticed something that wasn't

there before. It was an Airedale and he was tethered to a doghouse. Riley asked Joe about the dog and he said he had bought him a few years ago to accompany him on his road-trips as a trucker, but bringing him along became more trouble than he thought. So Sam was left behind, tied outside, fed and watered by



his elderly father while he was gone. Sam had spent the last two years tethered to this doghouse.

As a dog lover, this situation disturbed Riley and she asked Joe if she could please try to find a better situation for Sam. Thankfully Joe agreed to allow her to pursue rehoming Sam. contacted me right away. Posts like this "grow legs" and quickly become viral so timing is always crucial in order to get the dog into rescue. Luckily there was a phone number for Riley and she answered the phone when I called her. She was willing to work with us to find Sam a home.

Since the need was immediate and we wanted Sam to be in a home the very next day, rescue partner Mary Jo and I talked about the situation and she remembered an application that we both found to be exceptional. Peter was readying his home for a new Airedale and was very passionate about welcoming a rescue into his home. As I reviewed his application again, I realized that he was a mere 30 minutes from this dog (and I am 5 hours). Would he possibly go and meet Riley and pick up the dog the next day? What a huge ask of someone I had never met! And Peter said YES!

Gifford and Me, By Peter Egler

I have been fortunate to have a dog in my life during most of my 57 years. I was a quiet middle child in a family of 11 children. It was often hard for me to get attention from my loving parents. But I could always count on our family dogs to be happy to see me and to want to spend time with me. They were my best friends.

From 1973 to 1985, I had the privilege of having an Airedale Terrier named Rex. I loved him very much, and I will miss him forever.

I currently live in Johnstown, PA with one of my brothers. In April 2020, our 15-year-old West Highland White Terrier Jake passed away. That was heartbreaking. After Jake's passing, I did not have a dog in my life for the first time in a long time. Our house seemed quiet and empty.

In 2021 I connected with the Airedale Rescue and Adoption of the Delaware Valley ("The Rescue"). I talked with them about the possibility of me adopting an Airedale at some point in 2021. I was moving into a new house in June, and I wanted to wait until after the move to get a new dog.

Fate changed my timetable. On May 23, 2021, at 11:00 a.m., I received a call from the Rescue saying there was an Airedale living in awful conditions about 30 miles away from Johnstown. They asked if I could take the dog that day as a foster. I was happy to volunteer to help. At 2:00 p.m. that day I met the dog and the young woman who had facilitated the rescue.

The dog had been chained outside on a farm for some time. The previous owners had named him, but they paid so little attention to the dog that the name meant nothing to him. I named him Gifford, after Gifford Pinchot, a two term Governor of Pennsylvania in the 1920's - 1930's, the first head of the U.S. Forest Service, a friend and colleague of Teddy Roosevelt, and a personal hero of mine. And we all know that Roosevelt was a big fan of Airedales!

I took the next week off from work so Gifford and I would have time to bond. We started to learn about each other. I learned that despite his life of isolation and neglect, he is a very loving and affectionate dog who loves meeting new people. He is intelligent, cooperative, and he picks up on patterns quickly. Gifford shows the potential to be a great student in the training classes we will attend.

Gifford has introduced me to many new people, including the exceptional people at the Rescue. He has also introduced me to neighbors with whom I had never interacted. Gifford regularly receives compliments on this looks and his manners.

In the three weeks we have been together, I have grown very attached to Gifford. When we are apart, I miss him. When we are together, I always have one eye and one ear on him to make sure he has what he needs. Gifford always keeps one eye and one ear on me. I feel very fortunate to have Gifford in my life. I am very thankful to the Rescue for bringing Gifford into my life, and for all the support they have given me since Gifford arrived.

* We strive to educate the public regarding the Airedale breed and responsible dog ownership.

* No ARADV volunteer conducts rescue activities for personal profit. All proceeds from fundraising activities, fees and donations will be used only for the benefit of rescued Airedales.

Airedale Rescue and Adoption of the Delaware Valley places dogs only in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Delaware.

IRS EXTRA DEDUCTION FOR 2021

This is a special note to those who have donated or those who are planning to donate to ARADV in 2021. In 2020, an extra up to \$300 in qualified cash/check donations was allowed for taxpayers (an extra \$300 cap total for single, head-of-household or joint returns) even if they chose to take the standard deduction. In extending and upgrading this extra deduction into 2021, the CARES Act is allowing two temporary opportunities. In 2021, the additional \$300 donation cap again is permitted for single filers. For couples who file jointly, only in 2021, an additional \$600 donation cap may be claimed. Again, this extra deduction is in addition to the standard deduction. If you have any questions, please check with your tax advisor.






August 4, 1942 ~ December 11, 2020

DOG LICENSE REMINDER

Properly licensing your dog is a part of every Rescue Agreement, and every adopter has promised to keep their licenses current.

In **Pennsylvania**, licensing is done annually by county. Licenses can be purchased at the county treasurer's office, and various other locations. and mail-in renewal is offered. A lifetime license is available for \$51.50, with proof that the dog is micro chipped or tattooed (\$31.50 if dog has been spayed or neutered). Fines for non-compliance are \$300.

In New Jersey, annual licenses are available from the licensing clerk of the local municipality, with proof of Rabies vaccination. The maximum fee allowed is \$21.

In **Delaware**, dog licenses are managed by the state (a

change in 2016.) Licenses are available for one, two or three years at a time, with proof of Rabies vaccination. Apply online at www.petdata.com/Delaware, by phone at 877-730-6347, or at 9 locations throughout the state. Lower rates apply for sterilized dogs. Fines of \$50 and up for non-compliance.

MORRIS & ESSEX SHOW OCTOBER 6, 2021 SOMERSET, NJ

Every five years since 2000 (Covid delayed 2020's show), the elegance, glamour and quality of Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge's original dog show which was held on her polo fields is brought back to life for a day. The show began in 1937 in Madison, New Jersey and 4,000 dogs of all breeds were shown in front of 50,000 spectators. Coming this October to Somerset, New Jersey, you have the opportunity again to witness this special event!



Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge, daughter of William Rockefeller and niece of John D. Rockefeller, Sr. was born into a privileged life. In 1907 she married Marcellus Hartley Dodge and they became one of the richest young couples in America.

Mrs. Dodge's interest in dogs, art and philanthropy led to her founding the Morris & Essex Kennel Club in 1927. The shows held on her estate were not only grand dog show events, but also high society events where men and women dressed in elite New York fashion. They continued for 30 years until the last show in 1957.

The Morris & Essex show revival began in 1996 by Cherrybrook founder and dog world philanthropist Wayne Ferguson. Designs to recreate the original atmosphere of M&E's style and grace are carefully considered and planned during the off-years of the show by the show committee. The outdoor show features Renaissance style tents, bright banners and flags, exquisite flowers and décor, and even a classic car display from the 1930's. The Committee also goes as far as using underground wiring so there is no generator noise. You will see exhibitors wearing period clothing, making the overall experience a glorious step back into time.

Preventing Orthopedic Problems

Orthopedic problems in dogs are common, with arthritis affecting an estimated 20% of dogs older than 1 year of age. Arthritis risk increases as your dog ages, and the condition can significantly impact your dog's quality of life. You cannot completely eliminate your pet's disease risk, but you can take precautions, starting when your dog is a puppy, to decrease their risk for orthopedic disease. Put these four preventive measures into action to help keep your dog's bones and joints healthy.

1: Feed your puppy an appropriate diet

When shopping for puppy food, you likely become overwhelmed by the aisles of choices. Hip dysplasia, which is one of the most common orthopedic conditions to affect dogs, is influenced by genetics and growth rate. If your puppy is projected to weigh more than 40 pounds as an adult, feeding them a puppy food formulated specifically for large breeds is one of the best things you can do to improve joint health.

2: Have your puppy spayed or neutered at the appropriate time

Veterinarians have historically recommended spaying or neutering puppies at approximately 6 months of age, but recent evidence suggests that may be too early. Spaying or neutering your puppy before their bone growth is complete eliminates hormones, increasing the chance for hip dysplasia. Studies comparing orthopedic conditions, including hip dysplasia and cranial cruciate ligament disease, in intact versus spayed or neutered dogs show a lower disease rate in intact dogs.

3: Maintain your dog at a healthy weight

Obesity increases joint strain and can lead to excessive wear and tear, or exacerbate existing arthritis. Maintaining your dog at an ideal body condition throughout their life can significantly reduce arthritis risk and severity.

4: Institute regular, low-impact exercise

Regular exercise is critical, but growing puppies should not run on hard surfaces, as the repetitive impact can interfere with proper bone and joint development. Safe, low-impact exercise options for your puppy include walking, romping in the grass with another puppy, and swimming.
